Mr. H. Weston Sparkes, who was accompanied by Mrs. Sparkes, was present at the annual meeting of the Unionist and Coalition Association at the Conservative Club. A special circular, signed by Colonel Gilbert Acland Troyte, J. P. (Huntsham Court) and Major Moutray Read, resulted in a large attendance, which included the Rev. E. V. Cox (Vicar) and Mrs. Cox, Mr. W. M. Pile (Exeter), Mr. F. Townsend (Hon. Secretary and Treasurer Bampton Conservative Club Company), Mr. A. Ross Butler (Hon. Secretary Conservative Club).
